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Executive summary

MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center collaborated to complete a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) for the service area, which includes 22 zip codes in five counties: Mercer, Henderson, Henry, Knox, Rock Island and Warren. The CHNA was developed in collaboration with an advisory committee of community and public health partners. The CHNA was presented to and adopted by the MercyOne Genesis Benefit Advisory Committee on April 1, 2025, and the Genesis Health System Board of Directors on April 3, 2025.

Seven significant health needs were identified based on the information gathered through a community survey, community focus group and secondary data review. Using a prioritization survey, members of MercyOne, Genesis Leadership Staff, the CHNA Advisory Committee and community members ranked each of the needs by severity, magnitude and feasibility of change.

The significant community health needs, ranked in order of priority, include:

- 1. Brain/Mental health
- 2. Access to care
- 3. Cancer
- 4. Diabetes
- 5. Heart Disease
- 6. Obesity, obesity-associated disease, exercise
- 7. Access to childcare

MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center will reconvene in the spring and summer of 2025 to develop a multi-year strategy to address identified community health and social needs.

Summary and impact of previous needs assessment

MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center completed the CHNA process independently last cycle.

MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center

The Genesis Board approved the previous Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) on November 4, 2021. The significant health needs identified in the FY21 CHNA, in order of priority, include:

- 1. Mental health
- 2. Access to health care
- 3. Obesity and its related chronic conditions of diabetes, heart disease and lack of physical activity
- 4. Cancer with a focus on breast and colon cancer screenings

A wide range of priority health and social issues emerged from the CHNA process. MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center determined it could effectively focus on only those needs which were most pressing, underaddressed and within its ability to influence. MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center, in collaboration with community partners, chose to focus on initiatives addressing the following needs:

- 1. Mental health
- 2. Access to health care
- 3. Obesity and its related chronic conditions of diabetes, heart disease, and lack of physical activity
- 4. Cancer with a focus on breast and colon cancer screenings

The below section highlights actions taken over the succeeding three years to address selected needs, as well as the impact of those actions:

2021 Implementation Strategy Summary

The resources of the hospital, feedback from the community and the Genesis strategic priorities were considered by the Genesis Board of Directors Community Benefit Advisory Committee as the identified health needs were reviewed and selected for improvement initiatives. Significant health needs to be addressed: GMC Aledo will focus on developing and/or implementing initiatives and measuring their effectiveness, to improve the following health needs:

#1 Nutrition, physical activity & weight to reduce chronic disease

#2 Mental health and substance abuse

#3 Access to health care including cancer screenings

The Genesis Board of Directors Community Benefit Advisory Committee agreed with the Aledo stakeholder committee that the organization could effectively continue to focus on two health needs plus a new one regarding access to health care including cancer screening. This implementation strategy identifies community health needs that GMC Aledo and Genesis Health System have decided to address in whole or in part and that are consistent with our mission. Genesis reserves the right to amend this implementation strategy as circumstance indicate. If, during these three years, other community organizations decide to address particular needs, then Genesis may refocus its limited resources to meet other needs identified during the CHNA process.

CHNA IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

Fiscal Years 2021 - 2024

Hospital Facility: GMC Aledo

CHNA Significant Health Need: Nutrition, physical activity & weight to reduce chronic disease Prioritization #: 1

Brief Description of Need: Nutrition

The CHNA survey identified 22.5% of the Mercer County population as having low food access compared with 19.4% of Illinois residents and 22.4% of the U.S. Low food access is defined as being more than half a mile from the closest supermarket, supercenter or grocery store. Low food access is a greater problem for low-income residents. For example, 27.3% of the Mercer County low-income population reported low food access versus 14.7% of Illinois residents and 18.9% of US.

Physical Activity - 20.0% of Mercer County adults reported that they did not have leisure time for physical activity. This is comparable to the Illinois rate (20.9%) and US rate (22.1%).

Weight - 33.6% of adults in Mercer County are considered obese (BMI greater than 30.0). 29.5% of Illinois residents and 29.5% of the US are obese. This percentage has increased from 24.6% in 2004 to 33.6% for Mercer County adults. Likewise, the percentage of Illinois adults with a BMI of 30.0 has increased from 22.7% to 29.5% and for the U.S. the percentage has risen from 23.1% to 29.5% over the same time period.

Chronic Disease - The percentage of adults with heart disease in Mercer County is 11.6% versus 3.8% for Illinois as a whole and 4.4% for the U.S.

Goal: To reduce the percentage of Mercer County adults who are obese.

CHNA Impact Measures CHNA Baseline Target

Percentage of Mercer County residents with BMI > 30 33.6% 29.5%

Actions that GMC Aledo intends to take:

- 1. Continue to promote the WondrHealth Program to community residents. The WondrHealth program is a lifestyle change program that prevents and reduces the incidence of diabetes, high cholesterol, stroke and heart disease that when they co-occur increases of risk of Metabolic Syndrome. The program focuses on learning healthy eating behaviors of what, when and how to eat
- 2. Work with the YMCA to promote physical activity programs and wellness and U of I Extension on healthy eating options.

Plan to evaluate the impact: GMC Aledo Foundation Director and Genesis Health System Business Development staff will evaluate the number of people enrolled in the WondrHealth Program plus the number of people engaged in the activities of the YMCA and U of I Extension, as well as evaluate the results of the next community health needs survey regarding the percentage of people with a BMI greater than 30.

CHNA Significant Health Need: Mental health and substance abuse Prioritization #: 2

Brief Description of Need: Lack of mental health providers - The CHNA results indicate that there are only 2 mental health providers serving Mercer County for a rate of 12.8 per 100,000 population. For comparison – there are 230 mental health providers per 100,000 in Illinois and 202.8 per 100,000 for the country as a whole.

The percentage of Mercer County Medicare population with depression is 12.2%, which is lower than either the state (16.3%) or national (17.9%) rates. However, the percentage of Mercer County Medicare persons with depression has increased from 9.2% in 2011 to 12.2% in 2017.

Tobacco usage – Roughly 32% of Mercer County adults (age 18+) currently smoke some days or every day. Approximately 18.3% of adults in Illinois smoke and 17.8% of US residents reportedly smoke cigarettes.

Goal: To reduce the percentage of Medicare beneficiaries reporting depression.

CHNA Impact Measures CHNA Baseline Target - Percentage of Medicare beneficiaries reporting depression, from 12.2% to 9.0%

Actions that GMC Aledo intends to take:

1. Provide education regarding signs and treatment for depression to Genesis Health Group staff and others interacting with those 65+.

Mercer County Mental Health Consortium

Genesis Aledo will continue to collaborate with the Mercer County Mental Health Consortium to increase access to mental health services. Genesis Aledo will provide mental health counseling and medication management for individuals across the lifespan through GHG clinic

1. Apply for grant funding that would support mental health services in primary care (Genesis Health Group) settings.

CHNA Significant Health Need: Access to health care including cancer screenings Prioritization #: 3

Brief Description of Need: There are three primary care providers serving Mercer County. The primary care provider to 100,000 population for Mercer County is 19.2 compared to 80.1 for Illinois and 76.6 for the country as a whole. The percentage of Mercer County population living in an area affected by a health professional shortage area is 101.7%. This is significantly higher than 25.6% for Illinois and 23.1% for the U.S.

The CHNA results indicate that 24.03% of Mercer County adults (18+) do not have a regular doctor. This is higher than the state percentage 17.9% and US 22.07%.

There is a lack of data concerning cancer screenings for colorectal cancer, cervical cancer, etc.

Goal: To increase the number of primary care providers serving Mercer County.

Impact Measures:

- 1. The number of primary care providers in Mercer County will increase from 3 to 4.
- 2. The number of people who received cancer screenings.

Actions that GMC Aledo intends to take:

- 1. Continue efforts to recruit primary care providers to serve Mercer County.
- GMC Aledo will continue to collaborate with GHG clinic, Mercer County Health Department, and Mercer Foundation for Health to provide education on early detection for cancer through traditional and non-traditional methods of communication

3. GMC Aledo will also collaborate with these groups to identify individuals who may need screenings, then promote scheduling of screenings through direct mail and community events.

Plan to evaluate the impact: Business Development staff will review the survey results from the next CHNA survey to determine if Genesis has been able to recruit additional primary care providers as well as the number of people who have received a cancer screening


Written Comments

Community Description

Geographic Area

The geographic area for this assessment includes 22 zip codes in five (5) counties in Illinois. The five counties include Mercer, Rock Island, Henry, Henderson, and Warren counties. 94% of MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center patients reside within this area. This service area was identified based on the percentage of inpatient and outpatient market share attributed to those zip codes. The service area does not exclude low-income or underserved populations.

Population Characteristics

The total population of the service area, as recorded in the most recent census in 2024, is 36,369, and is trending downward. The central city of Aledo is projected to grow over the next five years even as Mercer County as a whole is shrinking. The population is primarily rural with Aledo as the largest city and a larger Quad Cities community to the north. The median age is 43.9, which is higher than the median Illinois age of 38.7 and median US age of 38.5. The population is mostly Caucasian, with 90.8% White, 1.6% Black, 0.2% Native American, 0.4% Asian, 3.2% Hispanic, and 0.9% other.

Community survey

Broader community input was collected through a 23-question survey in the fall of 2024. A total of 114 responses were collected. Surveys were distributed through the hospital, rural health clinic, Mercer County Health Department, (MCHD) community events, email, direct mail, posters, social media, social service organizations, and the YMCA. Mercer County is considered a medically underserved area by the Health Resources Services Administration. However, to ensure that the medically underserved, low-income and minority populations were represented in the results, partners and organizations helped in manually and electronically distributing the survey. For example, partners at MCHD, that provide daily services to the Women, Infants and Children Program (WIC) a limited income-based program, and the Mental Health Action Program (MHAP) that case managers data indicates are 65% Medicaid eligible and 42% lack a primary care provider at the time of intake as clients. The rural health clinic includes a panel of 33% of patients that are either Medicaid eligible or lack insurance. Eagle View: Eagle View is a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) where all patients are part of the underserved populations received access to and completed a survey. A copy of the survey is included in the appendix.

Assessment process

Community assessment occurred through secondary data pulled from state and national databases, primary data from both inpatient and outpatient numbers, input from the CHNA Advisory committee made of community residents some with lived experience, and a community survey. This process began in early 2024 by analyzing the previous CNHA from Aledo, identifying the current service area and identifying the zip codes from which to gather data, analyzing data from several local health assessments and then comparing this data to state and national databases. The local health assessments reviewed included the Mercer County Health Department I Plan, Eagle View (federally qualified health center) Community Health Needs Assessment, and County Health Rankings. This review allowed for a baseline understanding of the region's demographics and historical needs. The advisory committee then met to review a draft set of CHNA survey questions and provided feedback for suggested modifications. These modifications were made and then the survey was ready for distribution. Between October and November 2024, sweeping community input was collected through this community survey that was distributed throughout Mercer County, and the surrounding rural areas. In December 2024, the advisory committee, community residents, hospital leaders met to complete a first level prioritized a list of the five greatest needs in the community.

Community Organizations

Discussions between the steering team and members of the following organizations took place in December 2024 and January 2025. Their feedback and input on the community survey results, secondary data, and personal experiences assisted in prioritizing and identifying the significant needs in the community. On January 24, 2025, the following organizations met face-to-face to learn of survey responses and discuss secondary data. Participants then ranked each need within priority order, of 1, 2, 3. After that ranking, they were asked to list their thoughts or knowledge of the contributing factors to these needs or conditions. Finally, they verbally and then in writing provided information on the programs that their organization offered or where aware of that addressed the prioritized issues.

These organizations included: MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center, MercyOne Genesis Family

Medicine, Mercer County Health Department, Mercer County Family YMCA, Mercer County Better Together, Illinois Lyme Association, High Roads Advantage, City of Aledo, WRMJ Radio Station.

Community survey

Broader community input was collected from the community through a 24-question survey in the fall of 2024. A total of 114 responses were collected between October and November 2024. Surveys were distributed to community members and organizations throughout the service area, including, but not limited to, MercyOne Genesis Aledo Medical Center, MercyOne Genesis Aledo Family Medicine, Mercer County Health Department, Mercer County YMCA, Mercer County Mental Health Consortium, faith community through the Ministerial Alliance, Mercer County Senior Center, Mercer County Crisis Center. Requests to complete the online survey were posted on social media sites with a QR Codes access, as well as in physical locations. A copy of the survey is included in the Appendix.

Prioritized needs

The above chart outlining the data for each significant health need was shared with the CHNA Steering Committee. These leaders were asked to discuss and come to a consensus on the top issues based on the magnitude, severity, and feasibility of each need, data presented and their personal experiences working in the community. The committee utilized the following definitions for magnitude, severity and feasibility. Magnitude was defined as the number of people or individuals that may be affected by a certain condition or description of health. Severity was defined as to the degree that no prevention or intervention took place that this condition or description could lead to early death or disability. Feasibility was defined as the ability that health care systems could play a role in modifying the condition or outcome. According to this work, the significant community health needs, ranked order of priority, include:

- 1. Brain/Mental health
- 2. Access to care
- 3. Cancer
- 4. Obesity, obesity-associated disease, exercise
- 5. Access to childcare


















10. What are you TOP THREE (3) health concerns and social risks for children in your community? (Select three)




















