John Ingram, MD, has been an American Board of Family Medicine diplomate since 1995. He grew up in Ames, Iowa, and earned his undergraduate degree in biochemistry at Iowa State University in 1988. He attended medical school at the University of Iowa from 1988-1992, then completed his residency in Mason City, Iowa, in 1995. His residency exposed him to numerous difficult cases that prepared him for going into practice in rural Iowa. His residency was very focused on obstetrics, in addition to all facets of family medicine. Knowing he was going into rural medicine, he wanted to provide colonoscopy services in an underserved area. He studied with several surgeons and gastroenterologists and became proficient at performing lower endoscopy.

Dr. Ingram started his family practice career in Denison, Iowa, and has delivered approximately 1,000 babies over his 29-year career. He performed 2,500 colonoscopies, saving many patients from developing colon cancer. One of his goals when he practiced in Denison was to stamp out colon cancer in Crawford County. While he couldn't completely fulfill that goal, with surgeons' efforts in addition to his own, they reduced the rate drastically.

He served as president of the hospital board off and on for several years, as this was a rotating position. He also was medical director for two local nursing homes for over 20 years, in addition to serving as the medical director for Hospice for 10 years.

Recently, Dr. Ingram relocated to Waterloo, Iowa, where his daughter and four children live. He joined MercyOne Northeast Iowa Family Medicine and Residency as assistant faculty to pass on his experiences to young doctors. He enjoys the challenges of teaching.
